RE: APPEALS PPA-240-2032 & PPA 390-2029

Thank you for your letter of 19 November 2019 requesting advice on the practical application of the Scottish Government's finalised policy position on onshore unconventional oil and gas (UOG) development.

You will be aware that the Scottish Government published its finalised policy position on 3rd October. The statement outlining this policy position is available online on the Scottish Government web pages at https://www.gov.scot/publications/scottish-governments-finalised-policy-position-unconventional-oil-gas-development/

That statement sets out the particular concerns identified by the Scottish Government as the basis of the policy of no support for the development of unconventional oil and gas in Scotland. These include the insufficiency of epidemiological evidence on health impacts highlighted by Health Protection Scotland; the concerns from communities across Scotland regarding the disruption they anticipate on matters such as transport impacts, risks of pollution, and on their general health and wellbeing; and, concern regarding the compatibility of an unconventional oil and gas industry with Scotland's climate change targets¹.

As you indicate in your letter, planning decisions must be determined on their individual merits. Further, and as the Scottish Government's 2019 consultation addendum² and

finalised policy position expressly set out, Scottish Ministers recognise that applications for planning and other necessary consents may be made by those holding Petroleum Exploration and Development Licences (PEDLs), and that these will require to be determined by the relevant authorities (or decision makers) according to the law and policy in force at the relevant time.
